## Catch up premium policy

The literacy and catch up premium provides every secondary school in the country with an additional £500 for each year 7 pupil who did not achieve at level 4 in reading and/or maths at the end of key stage 2. This additional funding is used to support the further progress of these identified students.

## Year 7 Reading and Maths Catch-up Premium 2016

In 2013, schools received guidance in how the Catch-up premium should be spent from the 'Minister of State for Schools.'

'Schools should assess the needs of the needs of the individual pupils in your school and decide the best way to use the funding. You should select programmes and approaches which have either proved to be effective or which show early promise.'

Effective use of the funding may therefore include:

- Individual tuition in addition to classroom teaching
- Intensive small-group work
- Purchasing external services and materials to add to those provided by the school, for example, tutor services or proven computer based learning or online support
- Summer or holiday schools to deliver intensive catch-up over a short period

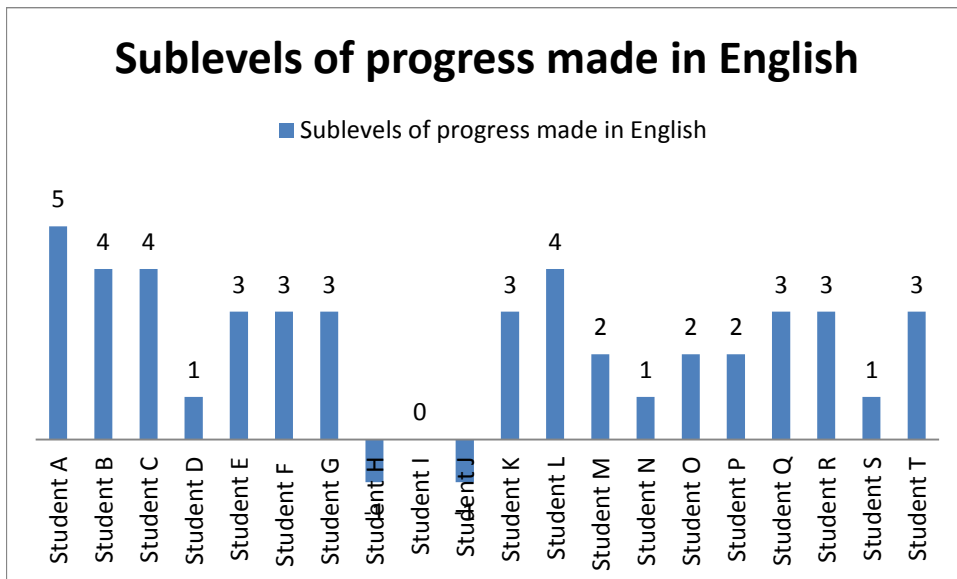

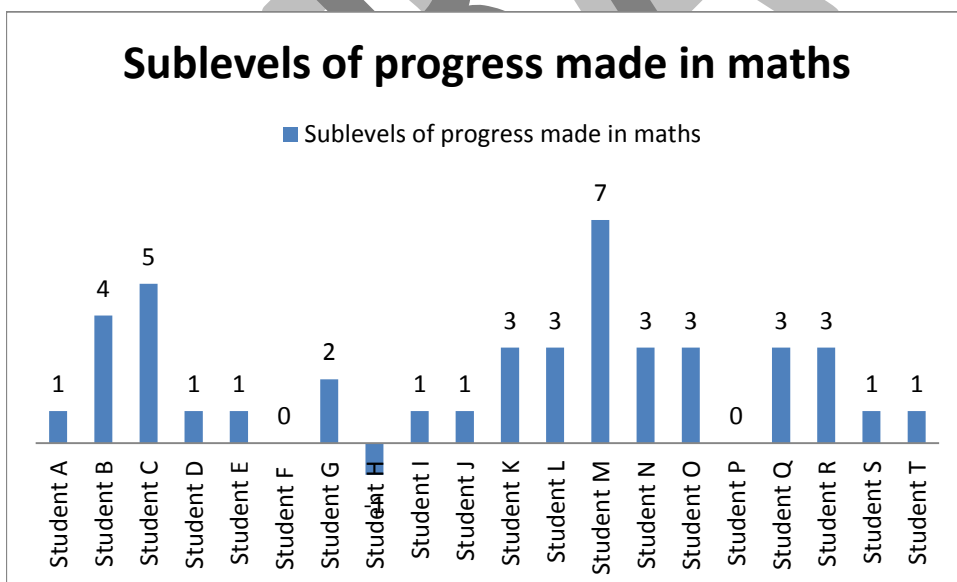
- Purchase of specific resources
