CEP UPDATE

It has been another busy term for CEP events, and it is great to see so many Pittville students engaging with the opportunities available.

On Monday, 20<sup>th</sup> November a group of students attended a 'Spill The Tea' event at All Saints' Academy. Nemindi Manthrivithana, 10Ab1 reports:

#### MFL LANGUAGE CHAMPIONS

On Monday, 20<sup>th</sup> November 2023 a group of Year 10 GCSE Language students went to a secret location in Bristol to take part in a GCHQ career in languages event.

As I am sure you are aware, GCHQ plays a part in the fight against terrorism, drug trafficking, and other forms of serious crime, as well as providing support to military operations across the world. Working with the UK's international partners, they help inform UK policy on a range of security topics. They employ a large team of language analysts covering a wide range of languages to help them. GCHQ set a theme for the day based on one of the above areas and students were set a number of tasks using their languages to uncover details about an international crime. Miss Codling.

#### "GCHQ The Word is not Enough - Language Champions!

Recently, we were selected to participate in an MFL trip. We went to Bristol Grammar School, and GCHQ set us special challenges and tasks throughout the day to test and further our language abilities. The majority of the tasks were decoding sentences and phrases into English. We had to use French, Spanish, German and Russian. One of the best things about the trip was the language taster we did at the beginning of the day. Our group split into 3 groups to do either Korean, Arabic, or Mandarin Chinese. One of us did the Arabic taster, which was really interesting, and the other did the Chinese taster session and learned basic numbers and introductions. We learned some basic phrases and numbers for the task we did later. It was really informative. After the taster we met back up with our group to get started on the main task, which was to get information about a crime with our language skills. We enjoyed meeting with other groups to discuss our ideas but also working on the task as a team. At the end of the day, we did a presentation about the task using information about France we had prepared before the trip. Over the day we were also given points depending on how well we did our tasks, and at the end it was revealed that our group had won. We were each given a £10 amazon voucher and a certificate. Overall, it was an incredibly fun and informative day, and everyone thoroughly enjoyed their time there."
