KEY MESSAGES

Punctuality

Please can I remind parents of the importance of punctuality at school. All parents/carers have a responsibility to ensure their children arrive at school before the bell at 8.30 am. School gates will open at approximately 8.20 am, with all students expected on site by 8.30 am. School gates will close at 8.30. We will continue to use our 'roll-call' system for our morning registration. This means that all students will be expected to be standing at their allocated place in their tutor room at the 8.35 am bell ready to answer their name on the register. Any student who is not present for roll-call and does not have a valid reason for being late will be issued with lunchtime detention on the day they are late.

Access to the school site for Students

Once our school gates close at 8.30, the only access to and from the site is via the main front gate on Albert Road which has an intercom directly to reception. Disabled parking bays are reserved for Blue Badge Holders only.

Summer Uniform

For Terms 5 and 6 students can wear summer uniform to school. Pittville logo polo shirts or a shirt and tie may be worn. Please note the polo shirts permitted are the Pittville logo shirts only.

Experts Dish Out Insights on Health and Safety

A group of Y10 and 11 Pittville pupils studying Health and Social Care and striving to pursue careers in the medical field, had the extraordinary opportunity to be part of the ground-breaking Q&A session organised by CEP-Cheltenham Education Partnership, during which a panel of distinguished experts from various fields in healthcare shed light on pressing issues surrounding health security, safety protocols, and medical innovations.

Hosted by Cheltenham Ladies College, this session brought together prominent figures including Prof Dame Jenny Harries, Prof Mark Pietroni, Dr Trevor Howe, Dr Liam Stanbury, Nick Oxlade, and Kirsty David.

Prof Dame Jenny Harries, the Head of UK Health Security Agency, and former Deputy Chief Medical Officer for England, emphasized the importance of proactive measures in ensuring public health and safety. She highlighted the role of data-driven decision-making and collaboration between healthcare agencies in mitigating health risks and tackling emerging threats.

Prof Mark Pietroni, Director for Safety at Gloucestershire Hospitals, delved into the intricacies of hospital safety protocols, emphasizing the need for continuous improvement and adaptation to evolving challenges. He stressed the significance of a robust safety culture within healthcare institutions to safeguard both patients and healthcare workers.

Dr Trevor Howe, Janssen Fellow and Head of Translational Genomics at Johnson & Johnson Innovation, provided insights into cutting-edge genomic research and its potential applications in personalized medicine and disease prevention. Dr Howe's expertise shed light on the promising advancements that genomics offers in revolutionizing healthcare practices.

Dr Liam Stanbury, a General Practitioner specializing in child health, sports medicine, and psychiatry, shared his perspectives on the holistic approach to healthcare, emphasizing the importance of addressing both physical and mental well-being. Dr Stanbury highlighted the crucial role of primary care physicians in promoting preventive healthcare and supporting patients through comprehensive treatment plans. Nick Oxlade, Strategic Lead Partnerships & Projects at the School of Health, and a Registered Adult Nurse, discussed the significance of interdisciplinary collaboration in addressing complex health challenges. He emphasized the importance of integrating nursing perspectives into healthcare policies and practices to ensure patient-centred care and optimal outcomes.

Kirsty David, Social Care Practice Placement Lead at the School of Health and a Registered Midwife, underscored the importance of addressing social determinants of health and promoting equity in healthcare delivery. She emphasized the need for collaborative efforts between healthcare professionals and social service providers to address the underlying factors impacting health outcomes.

The Q&A session provided a platform for in-depth discussions and knowledge-sharing among experts from diverse backgrounds in healthcare. By exchanging insights and perspectives, the panellists reinforced the importance of collective action and innovation in advancing health security, safety, and quality of care. As the world continues to navigate its way through unprecedented health challenges, the insights gleaned from sessions like this serve as valuable guides in shaping future healthcare policies, practices, and interventions.

BRITISH SCIENCE WEEK

It has been an exciting term for science at Pittville as we celebrated British Science Week. We kicked off British Science Week with assemblies all about fuel. From burning bags of methane, explosive bottle rockets flying across the hall, and even combusting tubes in reluctant teacher hands. Students were excited and thrilled as we saw how the Science of fuels literally drives our world forward.

Over 70 year 9 students went to the Birmingham Thinktank Museum for the day, and whilst there experienced a journey into the atom in the planetarium or a shocking talk about energy transfers in the real world. The next day 120 year 8 students went to Cotswold Wildlife Park to see results of evolution in the animals present, from lions to naked mole rats. The engaging talks from the keepers really brought adaptations to life. However, the highlight of the day may have been the baby goats and tag in the playground.

We also hosted 60 year 4 pupils from Dunalley School for a practical lesson on changing state. Our year 10s lent a hand by being classroom assistants, helping the year 4s with setting up the experiment, plotting a graph, and even how to wear goggles. The year 10s showed impeccable maturity and I was very proud at how helpful and engaging they were with the primary school students.

It was a thoroughly enjoyable week, and my thanks goes out to the staff, students, and technicians in supporting it.

Y10 TRIP TO BATH

On Monday, 18th March a group of Y10 MFL students attended a language workshop event in Bath. Elsie Darley, 10Ab1, has written an article about the trip. Ms Allan and Miss Luis.

GCHQ trip

"On the 18th of March twelve year 10 students (6 for Spanish, 6 for French) attended a languages workshop run by GCHQ at Bath Royal High School. The day started with a talk telling us about education pathways and jobs in languages. The speakers told us about their experience working in languages, how they trained, and what their jobs consist of. They also encouraged us to learn rarer languages. Following this, we challenged ourselves in language taster sessions, which would support us in the main task. The taster sessions were for rarer languages: Korean, Mandarin and Arabic. Next, we were taught some different types of codes and how to crack them.

We then moved on to the main task in which we had to solve a series of codes and translations to find details of a drug delivery, which is something linguists at GCHQ do. In each challenge, we had to work as a team, and use our new, rare language and code-deciphering skills alongside our target language skills (French or Spanish). The challenges were all unique and challenged us in different ways. For example we had to listen to an audio transcript in our target language to find key clues and details about the drug delivery. As a team we also had to adapt, as two people had to leave and attempt other challenges, to free one of the presenters, who had been 'captured'! This huge task mimicked the work linguists do at GCHQ and helped develop our language skills.

The week before the trip, we prepared maps of our countries with key communication systems, and cities. We used these in our final task, where we gave presentations in our target languages (Spanish or French) to a panel. We also incorporated details of the drug delivery from the main task, for example at which port the drugs entered Spain. Finally, we ended the day with making board games in our languages.

The whole day, we were challenged in Spanish/ French, and our language skills were furthered. We were encouraged to pursue and informed of different jobs in languages. It was a great experience."
